Victoria. Incorporated by Royal Charter, and P O. This town, the capital of the former Colony of Vancouver's Island, is situated about 850 miles north of San Francisco, and may be justly regarded as the next important port on the coast. The harbor is safe and easy of access to vessels drawing 14 or 15 feet of water, at all times, but vessels over that draught require the highest spring tides. This deficiency is made up, however, by the adjacent harbor of Esquimault, which can be entered at all seasons of the year, and where all the vessels of the British North Pacific Squadron lie. Victoria is a free port, and the increase of steam communication with the American Territories has already attracted an equal increase of business. The island is rich in minerals, gold, copper, iron, and coal. Its extensive coal fields, stretching a long distance on the east side of the island and the main land, give it an especial interest and importance to San Francisco. The town is well laid out with beautiful suburban scenery and drives. For eight months in the year the climate cannot be surpassed, and as a summer resort for tourists and invalids, it is unexceptionable. The town contains many handsome buildings and substantial wharves, and its municipal affairs are regulated by a Council and Mayor. Population estimated at 4,000.
