

PRESBYTERIAN.—There is at San Leandro a Presbyterian Church, not in a very satisfactory condition as regards growth and general prosperity. The Church has a \$1,600 debt. The congregation are zealous, and, with the increasing size of the county, will doubtless increase their numbers. The Sunday School has 50 scholars and a library containing 200 volumes.

CONGREGATIONAL.—There is a Congregational Church at Haywood, presided over by Rev. Mr. Seymour. The Sunday School is in a flourishing condition.

ROMAN CATHOLIC.—The Rev. Farther Nugent is pastor of the Catholic Church at San Leandro, which has a large membership. The same clergyman also officiates at Haywood, where the Church has lately been rebuilt at a cost of \$6,000. The Church is in a very prosperous condition.
