PACHECO—In Pacheco Valley, is about four miles southeast of Martinez. It contains about 600 inhabitants, and is the principal business emporium of Contra Costa county. It was first laid out in 1857. The business of the place supports eight or ten merchandising establishments, two large lumber yards, two hotels, two livery stables, a flour mill, a foundry and machine shop, three wagon and carriage shops, four blacksmith, one tin and two harness shops; two churches—Presbyterian and Catholic—a public library, a Lodge of Odd Fellows, one of Good Templars, a Tribe of the Improved Order of Red Men, and a brass band. Pacheco is immediately surrounded by a rich and finely improved agricultural district. Grain is the principal thing raised, and more than one-half of the grain product is shipped at this landing, the average being not less than 700,000 bushels annually, three-fourths of which is wheat. The official paper of the county is published at Pacheco. There are three daily stage lines running through this place, from different points in the valley, connecting with the boats at Martinez for San Francisco, Sacramento and other points.
