**Marin County. Organized 1850. Bounded north by Sonoma, east by Sonoma and the bays of San Pablo and San Francisco, south by the Golden Gate, and southwest and west by the Pacific Ocean. Area, 570 square miles. Assessed valuation of property for 1874, \$7,408,438. County seat, San Rafael. Principal towns—Bolinas, Novato, Olema, Tomales, San Quentin and Sausalito. Resources, agricultural and pastoral, this being distinguished as the principal dairying county in the State. The topographical feature of Marin is that of a high peninsula, separating the waters of San Francisco Bay from the Pacific Ocean. The highest elevation is Mount Tamalpais, which has an elevation of 2,600 feet, and forms a conspicuous landmark to vessels approaching the coast. Being contiguous to the ocean, the western slopes are favored by summer fogs, which keep the hills clad in perpetual verdure, thus perfecting its grazing capacities. Here are some of the largest and most complete dairying establishments in the world, at one of which 2,500 milch cows are kept, and every facility and convenience which skill and enterprise suggest are supplied. The manufacture of paper is carried on at Tomales Bay, and there is a powder mill in the same vicinity, but is maintained in idleness by other mills. The North Pacific Coast Railroad, a narrow-gauge, traverses the county from Sausalito on the Bay of San Francisco to Tomales on the Pacific, having a length of fifty-three miles. A short railroad of but four miles in length, from San Rafael to San Quentin, connects at the latter point with a line of ferry to San Francisco. A railroad from San Rafael via Novato to Petaluma is proposed, with evidences of determination to construct. At San Quentin is the State Prison, where are usually confined about 1,000 prisoners, who are mostly engaged in manufactures of harness, saddles, leather boots, shoes and furniture, being leased to contractors at certain rates per man. Cereals and vegetables are largely cultivated, and with great success. The statistics show this small county one of the most wealthy and prosperous in the State, in proportion to its population.**
