Battle Mountain, Lander Co, P O 85 miles
 north of Austin, is a station on the Pacific Railroad, 517 miles from San Francisco, and is the depot for Austin, also for the mining district of Battle Mountain, seven miles southwest in Humboldt County. This is a small village, established since the construction of the railroad, and is situated at the junction of Reese River Valley with the valley of the Humboldt. Lines of stages leave daily for Austin and Belmont on the arrival of the train from San Francisco, and also to the mining camps in Battle

Mountain District and to Cornucopia in the north. Large quantities of lead, copper, and silver ores are taken from this point by the cars to San Francisco, or the east for reduction and refining. This being the depot for Calca District, 12 miles south, Bullion District, 16 miles east, and Jersey District, 23 miles southeast. This is also the principal wool-shipping point in the State, having a large depot and packing establishment. One newspaper, *Measure for Measure*, is published weekly.

Belmont, Nye Co, P O and County seat; is
 in the heart of a rich silver mining section in south-eastern Nevada, in the district of Philadelphia, and is connected by daily stage with Austin, 55 miles distant. The mines of the locality were discovered in 1866, building commenced in 1867, and a large and busy town soon occupied this, till then, vacant place in the wilderness. The village is situated in a pleasant, well watered ravine, overlooking Ralston Valley, where, a few years previously, Judge Ralston, formerly a distinguished citizen of California, having lost his way, had wandered and perished. Villages, mining camps, and ranches now occupy the section then marked on all maps as "Unexplored Regions." The principal mining incorporations of the district are, the Belmont, Monitor Belmont, El Dorado South, and El Dorado North, which have produced a large amount of bullion. A few miles west is Jefferson District, where are the Jefferson, Prussian, and other mines of great value, and which add largely to the trade of Belmont. Very costly and efficient quartz mills have been constructed in both districts, the rattle of whose stamps and the shrieking whistle of the engines enliven this isolated town of the wilderness. One newspaper, the *Courier*, is published weekly.
