 or fraction thereof
 This includes all matter written or partly
 written or matter closed against in-
 spection
 Second Class Matter—When mailed by
 publishers or by news agents to reg-
 ular subscribers—one cent each pound
 or fraction thereof; when mailed by
 others—one cent for each four ounces
 or fraction thereof
 This includes only newspapers or peri-
 odicals entered as second class mail
 matter
 Third Class Matter—One cent each two
 ounces or fraction there of

This includes all printed matter other
 than second class matter, also seeds,
 bulbs and plants which are not food
 stuffs

Fourth Class Matter—One cent each
 ounce or fraction thereof

This includes all mailable matter other
 than the foregoing—samples, mer-
 chandise, patterns, etc

Foreign postage to countries included in
 Postal Union

Letters—Five cents each half ounce or
 fraction thereof

Postal Cards—Two cents each

Double Postal Cards—Four cents each
 Newspapers and other printed matter—
 One cent each two ounces or fraction
 thereof
