

the east by San Leandro Bay; on the west and south by the waters of the great Bay of San Francisco. Alameda is the home of the bungalow, containing perhaps the most beautiful streets of bungalows in the bay region of California. The lawns of many houses slope down almost to the water's edge. Long, white, sandy beaches attract thousands of pleasure seekers to enjoy swimming and bathing through nearly every month of the year. Hundreds of rowboats and yachts gathered along the beaches or in the quiet waters of San Leandro Bay testify to the interest in sailing and rowing.

POPULATION.

The present volume contains by actual count, after deducting all names of firms, churches, schools, etc., the names of 122,066 persons, of which 85,700 are shown in Oakland, 25,000 in Berkeley and 11,366 in Alameda. Taking these figures as a basis in computing the population and estimating that each name in the directory represents at the rate of 2% persons, which is considered by all directory publishers as a conservative multiple, we find the population as follows:
