There are accommodations for fifty patients, and a competent corps of nurses to attend to their needs. The operating rooms are equipped with the latest appliances of science, and there are none better fitted for safe and competent work than those of the Roosevelt Hospital.

A training school has been established, under the personal supervision of Mr. Shingle. A staff of well-known specialists gives lectures, and the head nurse, Miss Weir, of Jefferson Hospital, Philadelphia, is recognized as one of the best in the country. Mention is also due Miss Ada Hammond, who is in charge of the operating room. Physicians concede her great efficiency in assisting at surgical cases.

The Emergency Hospital for Berkeley is located in an annex of the Roosevelt, with separate operating and reception rooms. The establishment of this necessity to Berkeley is due to the kindness of Mr. Shingle, who will see that all emergency cases receive the best of care. There is also a maternity college.
