Arcata.

This town having post, telegraph, and express offices, is situated at the northern end of Humboldt Bay, fourteen miles distant from Eureka, by land, and seven miles by water. It is the second town in size in the county; enjoys a fine and growing trade from the large farming community in the vicinity of the town, and is the depot of supplies for the gold diggings on Klamath and Trinity Rivers.

Arcata will naturally be the seat of great activity in the organization of mining outfits during the coming year, as it will be the preferred route of parties going to the gold fields of the New River District in northern Trinity.

The location of the town is beyond question as beautiful as could be found on the bay, and fringed with the woodlands which environ it, it presents an attractive appearance. It is prettily laid out, and substantially built. Among its business establishments are a tannery, two steam saw mills, a shingle mill, a flouring mill, and the ordinary business incident to a place of its size. It has also three churches, three public schools, and a public reading room, and a circulating library. Its hotel accommodations are good. The Union Hotel, kept by Jacob Richert being worthy of special note, The population of the town is about 1,500. Direct steamer communication is maintained with San Francisco.
