Eureka.

This, the county seat of Humboldt
 and the commercial metropolis of north-
 ern California, is admirably situated on
 the eastern shore of Humboldt Bay,
 seven miles from the entrance to the
 harbor, and is a striking illustration of
 the wonderful growth of our American
 towns. Without any of the fictitious
 and ephemeral growth which the early
 gold excitement effected in many por-
 tions of the State, Eureka has, from an
 absolute wilderness, grown in the short
 space of 30 years to a city of between
 seven and eight thousand people, and
 every step of its progress has been
 marked by a conservatism which has
 meant permanency.
