Petaluma.

THIS, the second town of the county,

is situated at the head of a navigable
 estuary, known as Petaluma Creek,
 which reaches inland a distance of 15
 miles from the bay. The total distance
 from San Francisco is forty-two miles.
 The great advantage of this location, be-
 ing connected, both by rail and water,
 with San Francisco, together with a
 surrounding back country of great ex-
 tent and richness, early gave a great
 impulse to this section of country.
 The city was incorporated in 1858. It
 has perfect drainage, streets are well
 graded, and its architectural construc-
 tion, both as regards business blocks and
 private dwellings, will compare favor-
 ably with towns of greater pretensions.
 Its schools, societies, churches, and
 news papers are of a superior class, and
 well supported.

The city also ranks as one of the first
 in the State as an export point for
 dairy produce. It has complete post,
 express and telegraph accommodations,
 and a population of over 5,000.
