## Hospitals.

**BRITISH HOSPITAL**—Main above Folsom street, Rincon Point; established in 1852; supported by Government of Great Britain. Thos. Bennett, M. D. Superintendent and Physician; Mrs. Elizabeth Hall, Stewardess and Nurse.

**COUNTY HOSPITAL**—SW corner Francisco and Stockton. Charles H. Raymond, Resident Physician; William M. Higgins, Apothecary.

**FRENCH HOSPITAL**—Sustained by the French Benevolent Society; Simmons and Fifth. (See Benevolent Associations.)

**GERMAN HOSPITAL**—Sustained by the German Benevolent Society; Brannan and Third. (See Benevolent Associations.)

**HOSPITAL OF THE SISTERS OF MERCY**.—(Late State Marine Hospital); Nos. 324 and

326 Stockton street, between Broadway and Valjejo streets. The religious Sisterhood attend the patients in person; they number twenty, who are distributed about the various duties of the Hospital, some as nurses, others attending the departments of cooking, washing, etc. Average number of patients, twenty per month. Physicians and Surgeons, visiting, Drs. Bowie and Whitney; Resident Physician and Surgeon, Dr. O'Brien; Apothecary, Dr. Barry.

**UNITED STATES MARINE HOSPITAL**—Rincon Point, between Main and Spear. Organized 16th March, 1852. Original officers: D. Jamison, Surgeon; Rev. O. Clark, Superintendent; R. McMillan, Surgeon; G. W. Beach, Apothecary. Building erected November, 1853.

*Officers*—Richard T. Maxwell, Surgeon and Physician; John Y. Lind, Assistant Surgeon; M. A. Sullivan, Steward; F. T. Maynard, Apothecary; Wm. Lindop, Head Nurse. This is one of the most splendid public edifices in the State. It is four stories high, besides an excellent basement, and is capable of accommodating five hundred patients. It occupies one of the most conspicuous positions in San Francisco, and from its windows can be seen the entire city on the north, the beautiful town of Oakland on the east; in the distance the Mission Dolores, and on the north, embraced by the waters of the Bay, Goat and Alcatraz Islands. Daily admissions, 6; deaths per month, 4; average number of patients, 150.

**PRIVATE HOSPITAL**—DR. COOPER; Mission between Second and Third. In this institution are treated patients who suffer from diseases of the eye, ear and general surgical affections.

## Cemeteries.

**CEMETERY, LONE MOUNTAIN**— $2\frac{1}{4}$  miles W from Montgomery and directly opposite California, road mostly traveled leads from Bush. This cemetery was dedicated in June 1854, and is the property of private individuals, whose design is to incorporate soon. It contains an area of 160 acres. The grounds are beautifully undulating, with avenues leading through the ravines and then gradually rising to an eminence, from which you have a commanding view of the surrounding country. On the south, three-eighths of a mile distant, stands the celebrated Lone Mountain, a lofty conical shaped hill, from which the cemetery derives its name. On the east lies the city and the bay with the villages of Oakland, Alameda and Clinton, and in the distance Mount Diablo. On the north may be seen the Bay of San Pablo, Angel's and Alcatraz Islands, Saucelito Bay and village, and the entrance to the Golden Gate. On the west in the distance, you have the Farrallone Islands and the Pacific Ocean, the roar of whose waves are sounding a continual requiem as if to soothe the spirits of the dead. The shrubbery is mostly evergreen, containing more than twenty different kinds of flowering shrubs. About 2,000 interments have already been made within the inclosure, and the improvements now made and others designed,
