The law for the establishment and regulation of the United States Mint, and the branches thereof, provides that any person may deposit with the officers in charge of the same, gold and silver in bullion, grain or lumps, which, if requested, shall be refined, assayed, and cast into bars or coined, as speedily as possible after the receipt thereof, the bars to be stamped in said mint or branches, in such manner as shall indicate the weight, fineness, and value of the same; the expense incurred to be retained from each deposit so made, at such rates and charges, and under such regulations, as may from time to time be established. The said charges not to exceed the actual cost of refining, casting, and forming said bars, including labor, wastage, use of machinery, material, etc., or $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for coinage, to be received by the Treasurer of the Mint at which the deposit was made, and by him accounted for to the Treasurer of the United States.

Mails for Acapulco, Panama, and South America, are forwarded on the 3d, 13th, and 23d, of each month, and close at fifteen minutes past eight A.M., on the morning of the sailing of the steamer.

Mails for China, the Sandwich Islands, and Australia, are forwarded from the Post Office by every suitable opportunity, containing all letters and papers, the inland postage of which is prepaid to San Francisco, leaving the sea postage to be collected in the ports where the mails are delivered.

Letters should be fully prepaid by stamps. Drop Letters must be prepaid by postage stamps. Letters will not be sent with stamps cut from stamped envelopes.

All printed matter is now forwarded to the East by steamer, on the 3d, 13th, and 23d, of each month.

The Post Office opens at eight o'clock A.M. and closes at 4 o'clock P.M. every day except Sundays. Open Sundays from 9 to 10 o'clock A.M.

The General Delivery will be open from 7 o'clock to 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock every evening except Sundays. One window will be kept open ALL NIGHT, every night except Sundays.
