LADIES' PROTECTION AND RELIEF SOCIETY.—Established August 4th, 1853. Incorporated August 9th, 1854. The society has under its supervision a Home where friendless or destitute girls under the age of fourteen and over three years, and boys under ten and over three years old, may be received and provided for until permanent homes in Christian families can be secured. The adults in the Home are embraced in two classes: first, those who are able to labor, who are received temporarily until employment can be obtained; second, those who by reason of age or infirmity are incapacitated for labor, without means, or friends to care for them.

The building is situated on Franklin Street, between Post and Geary, and is an ornament to the city. It is two stories high, with full basement and French roof (equal to four stories). It was commenced October 1st, 1863, and completed April 20th, 1861. It is forty-eight by eighty-one feet, contains forty-seven rooms with all the modern improvements, gas, water, etc. The cost of the edifice, including grading, fencing, etc., was \$23,000.

The number of inmates has been constantly increasing, and now (June, 1867) numbers 110 children and 13 adults.
