CHURCHES.

BAPTIST.

First Baptist Church.

Rev. J. B. THOMAS, D.D., pastor; location, north side Washington Street near Stockton. Pastor's residence, 603 Dupont Street.

This church was organized in June, 1849, under the labors of its first pastor, Rev. O. C. Wheeler. The church lot was purchased in the spring of that year for the sum of \$10,000. The first house of worship was dedicated in August, 1849, and was the first Protestant house of worship erected in California. Mr. Wheeler's pastorate ended in November, 1851, who was succeeded by the Rev. B. Brierly in May, 1852. In the summer and fall of 1853, the wooden building was removed, and the basement of the present edifice was erected at a cost of \$13,000. In this the congregation worshipped until September, 1857, when it dedicated its newly-finished building which it had completed, for the sum of \$16,000, including upholstery.

Number of communicants, three hundred and fifty-three. The Sunday School has an average attendance of about three hundred and forty. Number of scholars enrolled, about five hundred and seventy. The library contains over three thousand volumes.

Sabbath services morning and evening; Sabbath School at 1 P. M. Prayer meeting every Wednesday evening; Young People's Meeting every Thursday evening; Church Covenant Meeting the Friday evening preceding the First Sabbath in each month.

From this Church the Second Baptist Church was organized, December, 1862; the Tabernacle Baptist Church, December, 1865; and the San Pablo Baptist Church, February, 1867.

Second Baptist Church.

This house of worship is located on the corner of Fifth and Jessie Streets. Rev. C. R. HENDRICKSON, D.D., pastor; residence, 325 Sixth. The first steps for the organization of this church were taken in 1860, when Dr. Cheney's congregation established a Mission interest in the Nonantum School House on Third Street, near Bryant. The Sunday School was under the superintendence of H. H. Heath. After several changes, a lot was purchased on Fifth Street,

corner of Jessie, where the present church was built and organized December 22d, 1862. Rev. H. A. Sawtelle was the first pastor, who continued to officiate until October, 1866, when he retired from his pastoral charge and established the Union Square Baptist Church. The Rev. C. R. Hendrickson, for several years pastor at Stockton, was called by the congregation to fill the vacancy, and he entered upon his duties on the first of January, 1867; the Rev. O. W. Briggs officiating during the time the congregation was without a regular pastor. This church is now in a flourishing condition, with a membership of one hundred and sixty. It is designed to erect, at an early day, a large and commodious edifice in the neighborhood of the present site. Services are held each Sabbath at 11 A. M. and 7 1/2 P. M. Prayer meetings on Wednesday evening.

A Sunday School, with an average attendance of one hundred and fifty-five, and with a library of twelve hundred and fifty volumes, is connected with the Church; Dr. J. C. Spencer, Superintendent, and William Wright, Librarian. The school meets Sunday, at one o'clock P. M.

Third Baptist Church (Colored).

Pastor (vacant); location of church, southeast corner of Jane and Natoma Streets. Services at 11 A. M., and 2 1/2 and 7 1/2 o'clock P. M.

This church was organized in 1854, and formerly held worship on Dupont Street, between Filbert and Greenwich. In 1867, this congregation purchased the building and grounds formerly occupied by the Howard Presbyterian Church, at a cost of \$10,000, of which amount \$4,500 has been paid, leaving a balance of \$5,500 remaining yet unpaid. It has about eighty members. Church Clerk, Edward Parker.

Sabbath School—Three teachers and twenty-eight scholars.

Tabernacle Baptist Church.

Hours of Service—11 A. M., and 7 1/2 P. M., every Sunday, with a weekly prayer meeting every Wednesday evening.
