YREKA.—This place is located about twenty miles south of the northern State line, in the western part of Shasta Valley, at an elevation of 4,000 feet above the sea. As a result of the early gold-seekers' investigations in 1851, Yreka sprang into existence. The precious and eagerly sought for dust was found in large quantities, and the business and prosperity of the place steadily increased for several years; but as the placers began to diminish in their yield, the central business, as a consequence, gradually decreased and the decline of the place began; but now the quartz mining interest is increasing, and new mills for crushing are constructed every year. The place has now a population upwards of 1,500. The city is lighted by wood gas, and is also amply supplied with pure water. The schools here are well attended, and the churches and other public organizations similar to those of most other places of its size in California. Most of the country surrounding Yreka is a fine agricultural area, upon the development of which will depend the future wealth of the place, although mining will still be carried on with success indefinitely. Two newspapers are published here weekly, the *Union* and the *Journal*.
