TREASURE CITY.—This place, in White Pine county, at an elevation of 9,236 feet above the sea, is situated on the northern slope of Treasure Hill, near its summit, one and a half miles south of Hamilton. In 1867, large and extensive deposits of silver ore were discovered, and, as a consequence, a grand migration ensued, and the cities of Hamilton, Treasure City and Shermantown were built. For some time great excitement prevailed, until the old hill was proven not all silver, when it subsided and the place declined, though for a short period it was in a fluctuating state, like most new mining towns; but its decline was finally decided by a majority of the people proving somewhat migratory in their natures and seeking new fields for their labors, although mining will still be carried on with success, indefinitely. Two newspapers are published weekly, the *Union* and the *Journal*.
