The Olympic Club is in a very flourishing condition, having regularly organized classes in gymnastics, boxing, and fencing, on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings from eight to ten, and Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday afternoons from four to six. In August, 1874, the Club instituted a ladies' class, which has met with great success, the class numbering at present one hundred and seventy-eight members. Class days for ladies Wednesdays and Saturdays from ten A.M. to twelve M., the club rooms during those hours being given for their exclusive use.

Each member of the Club has the privilege of inviting three ladies, and on sending their names to the Board of Officers, they are presented with tickets, no charge being made.
