EXEMPT FIRE COMPANY.—Organized December 1862, in pursuance of Act of the Legislature, approved March 26, 1857, which provides that Exempt Members the Department may organize themselves, to be known and designated as the "Exempt Fire Company," and the purpose of associating themselves together for mutual benefit and assistance, and for the more effectual of receiving and administering the "Fire Department Charitable Fund," from which they are entitled by law relief.
