INDEPENDENT ORDER OF FORESTERS.

The special object of this Order is to furnish insurance—ranging in amount from \$500 to \$5,000—to its members at low but fixed rates, varying according to age. The amount insured for is payable at death, or in case the member be totally disabled by sickness or accident, one-half is then paid to himself personally, and he receives a paid-up certificate for the remaining one-half, paid to his beneficiary at his death. Each member of the Order is also entitled to free medical attendance, by the Court Physician, whenever he may require such attendance, and by the payment of a small sum monthly he is entitled to a sick benefit of from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per week, and a funeral benefit of \$50.00 at death. The Order is managed by the Supreme Court, with headquarters at Toronto, Ont. The High Court of California was instituted April 11, 1890, and is located at Los Angeles.
