DEPARTMENT OF CALIFORNIA AND NEVADA. Organized April 15, 1867. Headquarters City Hall, third floor. Objects—To organize, and to promote and perpetuate a fraternal feeling amongst all honorably discharged soldiers, marines and sailors who served in the war of the Rebellion; also to aid those of them who are in distress, and to provide for widows and orphans of deceased comrades. Eligibility to membership—Service between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865. No person eligible who has at any time borne arms against the United States.
