### MILITARY ORDER LOYAL LEGION U. S., COMMANDERY OF CALIFORNIA.

Instituted April 12, 1871.

**Principles**—First, a firm belief and trust in Almighty God, extolling Him under whose beneficent guidance the sovereignty and integrity of the Union have been maintained, the honor of the Flag vindicated, and the blessings of civil liberty secured, established and enlarged;

Second, true allegiance to the United States of America, based upon paramount respect for and fidelity to the National Constitution and Laws, manifested by discountenancing whatever may tend to weaken loyalty, incite to insurrection, treason or rebellion, or impair in any manner the efficiency and permanency of our free institutions.

**Objects**—The objects of this Order shall be to cherish the memories and associations of the war waged in defense of the unity and indivisibility of the Republic; strengthen the ties of fraternal fellowship and sympathy formed by companionship-in-arms; advance the best interests of the soldiers and sailors of the United States, especially of those associated as Companions of this Order, and extend all possible relief to their widows and children; foster the cultivation of military and naval science; enforce unqualified allegiance to the General Government; protect the rights and liberties of American citizenship, and maintain National honor, union and independence. ### NATIONAL UNION, THE.

A distinctively American, secret, beneficial order, organized and incorporated under the laws of Ohio, May, 1881.

It was formed to associate white male American citizens of good moral character, of sound bodily health, and between twenty and fifty years of age.

To advance its members morally, socially and intellectually.

To provide for the relief of sick and distressed members and their families.

To provide a benefit fund, from which, upon the death of a member, a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars shall be paid to such beneficiaries related to the deceased member by consanguinity or affinity, as may have been designated by the member, in accordance with the laws of the order.

Certificates are issued in amounts of \$1,000, \$2,000, \$3,000, \$4,000 or \$5,000.

Councils of the order are established in cities and towns of the healthy portions of the United States and Canada, there being now over 800 Councils in existence, with number of members, January 1, 1899, about 50,000.
