Wheeler Says That the Red Cross Must Do Hospital Work

OAKLAND BRANCH HOLDS IMPORTANT MEETING TO CONSIDER THE PLAN FOR PERMANENT LABOR.

Late Friday afternoon the Red Cross Society held a business session in the parlors of the First Methodist Church. Mrs. Ada Van Pelt in the chair. A fair representation of the one hundred and fifty members was given by the newly elected chairman of the work which they had accomplished in the past week.

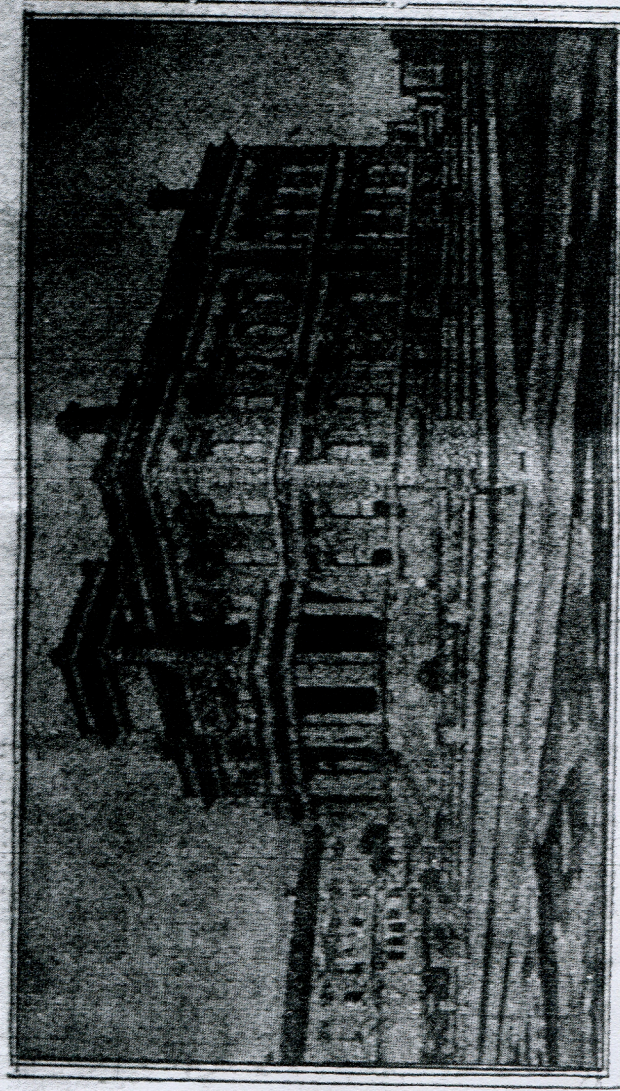
The question appeared to be whether the society should continue its work or whether it were better to discontinue all efforts for the present. President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California, who has been appointed by Dr. Devine to take charge of the Red Cross work in Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley was present and was invited by the chair to address the meeting.

President Wheeler said: "The position of the Red Cross in the present situation is difficult to understand. The emergency was so great that the relief organizations sprang to the front with their services and the Red Cross was for the time forgotten. In San Francisco it is not clear what position we occupy. It is most

difficult to do hospital work drawing our funds from James D. Phelan, who acts as the treasurer of the City's Committee. All the money which has been contributed to the relief of San Francisco, whether for provision, for clothing or for hospital work has been placed in his hands and we draw on him as we have need.

During the session the point was clearly made that the request had been repeated by the Governor and by the Mayor that the army take control of the situation and that General Greely had signified his willingness to receive and distribute provisions, but that all other work including financing, securing clothing and employment would remain with the Oakland Relief Committee.
