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
MRS. HUGHES SPEAKS TO 9A GIRLS

Mrs. Hughes was given a fine ovation by her appreciative audience.





Our graduation day coming on the anniversary of the adoption of the Flag of the United States of America makes this day a doubly memorable one to myself and to my classmates.



Mr. Cordrey as their keeper.




As we leave Branciforte after three happy years here, we feel that our teachers should receive a word of well deserved praise.
